

Overview

This document gives and overview of the BWF Classifier Training Framework and Certification structure.

Classification Framework and Personnel

The BWF recognizes the following positions within the classification framework:

Head of Classification	The Head of Classification is responsible for the direction, administration, coordination and implementation of classification matters for the BWF.		
Chief Classifier	This is the role assumed by a Senior International Classifier when appointed for a specific BWF Tournament or BWF sanctioned international tournament, responsible for the direction, administration, co-ordination and implementation of classification matters at that tournament		
Senior International Classifier	A Senior International Classifier is a person appointed and certified by the BWF as being competent to evaluate Players as part of a Classification Panel for International Tournaments. A Senior International Classifier can also serve as a Chief Classifier at a BWF Tournament or BWF sanctioned international tournament and can deliver BWF National Level 1 & 2 Classification courses.		
International Classifier	An International Classifier is a person appointed and certified by the BWF as being competent to evaluate Players as part of a Classification Panel for International Tournaments.		
National Level 2 Classifier	A National Level 2 Classifier has successfully completed the BWF National Level 2 Classifier training and has been certified to be a member of a Classification Panel at a National Tournament. The Classifier must have a medical background attend this course and is required to adhere to the Classifier Code of Conduct.		
National Level 1 Classifier	A National Level 1 Classifier has successfully completed the BWF National Level 1 Classifier training and has been certified to be a member of a Classification Panel at a National Tournament. The Classifier may or may not have a medical background and is required to adhere to the Classifier's Code of Conduct.		
Trainee Classifier	A Trainee Classifier is in the process of being trained by the BWF in one or more of the above positions. The Classifier is required to adhere to the Classifier's Code of Conduct.		



National Level 1 Classifier

The duties of a National Level 1 Classifier may include, but are not limited to:

- o being part of a Classification Panel at national Para badminton tournaments;
- o being part of a Protest Panel at national para-badminton tournaments;
- o attending and as required, running classification meetings at tournaments; and
- assisting in and supporting trainee national classifiers.

National Level 1 Course Structure

There are two main stages and the programme involves a minimum commitment of:

- o Attendance at 1 Tournament where training will be conducted:
 - 0.5 day of workshops / training theory;
 - √ 1 day of Player Evaluation observation;
 - √ 0.5 days observation of players in competition.
- o Participation in workshops, theory sessions, observation and practical tasks

Certification

A National Level 1 Certificate of Attendance is issued to participants who fully complete and actively participate in the course.



National Level 2 Classifier

The duties of a National Level 2 Classifier may include, but are not limited to:

- o being part of a Classification Panel at national Para badminton tournaments;
- o being part of a Protest Panel at national para-badminton tournaments;
- o attending and as required, running classification meetings at tournaments; and
- o assisting in and supporting trainee national classifiers.

National Level 2 Course Structure

There are two main stages and the programme involves a minimum commitment of:

- o Attendance at 1 Tournament where training will be conducted:
 - 0.5 day of workshops / training theory;
 - √ 1 day of Player Evaluation observation;
 - √ 0.5 days observation of players in competition.
- o Participation in workshops, theory sessions, observation and practical tasks
- o Completion of course assignment

Certification

A BWF National Level 2 Certificate will be issued to participants who successfully complete the above stages, including successful completion of assignments to the satisfaction of the BWF.



International Classifier

As required, the BWF may invite candidates who have completed the BWF National Level 2 Classifier training and meet the below prerequisites to progress to become International Classifiers. This selection is based on a number of factors including; qualifications, geographical location, language and experience.

The duties of an International Classifier may include, but are not limited to:

- o being part of a Classification Panel at BWF Para-Badminton sanctioned tournaments;
- o being part of a Protest Panel at BWF Para-Badminton sanctioned tournaments;
- o attending classification meetings at tournaments; and
- o assisting in classifier training and certification as requested by the Head of Classification.

Prerequisites for International Classifier Training

There are a number of pre-requisites to undertaking International Classifier training and to becoming a BWF International Classifier.

These are:

- Qualified in one or more of the following disciplines:
 - ✓ Medical: a doctor who has experience in dealing with people with the impairments and the Activity Limitations described in the Competition Profiles
 - ✓ Medical: a physiotherapist who has experience in dealing with people with the impairments and Activity Limitations described in Competition Profiles
- Able to communicate effectively in English undertake Classifier training and conduct Player Evaluations in English.
- Capacity to commit time as a Para-Badminton International Classifier once qualified.
- Successful completion of BWF National Level 1 & 2 Classifier training.

The following would be a significant advantage when being selected to train as an International Classifier:

- Experience and/or International Classifier in another sport.
- o Knowledge of badminton, its rules and physical and technical demands of the sport.

International Classifier Course Structure

There are two main stages and the programme involves a minimum commitment of:

- o Attendance at 2 International Tournaments where the following training will be conducted:
 - √ 1 day of workshops / training theory;
 - √ 1 day of Player Evaluation observation;
 - ✓ 2 days observation of players in competition.
- Participation in workshops, theory sessions, observation and practical tasks;
- o Completion of written assignment work between the 2 international events;
- Completion of assessment tasks.

International Classifier Training Assessment

Assessment is carried out on an on-going basis during the training programme. Methods of assessment include, but are not limited to:

- Observation, videoing and written assignments on Para badminton players in competition from a range of Sport Classes;
- o Observation tasks during Player Evaluation;
- o Written and oral theory examinations on Classification and Player Evaluation;
- Player Evaluation at the National Level and submission of evaluations (written and video) of players in a minimum of 4 different Sport Classes (Two wheelchair and two standing Sport Classes);
- Attendance and active participation in at least two BWF organized Classifier Training Courses (Stages 1 and 2) and three days of subsequent observation following Classification days.

International Classifier Training Couse Results

Course Facilitator provides feedback to candidates. Confirms areas where competencies are met.

- ✓ Pass- International Classifier certification recommended
- ✓ Provisional- If Trainee has not demonstrated all competencies, but has the potential to pass, the areas where competencies are not met are discussed and a training plan agreed to complete training. Further tasks and training can be assigned to achieve remaining competencies.
- ✓ Fail- If Trainee has not met the competencies and has not demonstrated the potential to achieve the competencies, they may be awarded a Not Competent status.

Certification

On successful completion of the course an Evaluation Report and a recommendation from the Course Facilitator is sent to the Head of Classification. The Head of Classification and Chair of the BWF Para badminton Committee make recommendations to the BWF Para badminton Committee and Council for their endorsement of new International Classifiers. Upon endorsement from the BWF Council, a certificate will be issued by the BWF to the successful candidate.

The newly certificated International Classifier will be supported during their first international tournament. A Senior International Classifier will be assigned as the mentor for the new classifier and will be present during the first international competition assisting and providing support and guidance as required.



Curriculum Content Overview – International Classifier Training

The BWF Course Facilitator is responsible for the preparation of course material and assessment tasks for any particular learner group depending on individual backgrounds, entry point and current competencies.

The following gives a broad idea of the core content areas of the curriculum.

Essential components of International Classifier training curriculum, include:

- o badminton rules / regulations including those that govern classification;
- o BWF classification system, roles, responsibilities;
- classification theory;
- practical training player evaluation;
- o training in administration and management;
- o professional conduct and ethical behavior;
- o communication, cross cultural communication, cultural differences and diversity.
